#### **United Utilities information request**

United Utilities intends to conduct a survey of the sewage network in Audlem to assess its current state and what improvements will be required to ensure the system is fit for purpose in the future. Any information that residents can supply about significant occurrences involving wastewater flooding or odours they have encountered with the public sewage system would help inform this process. Please include:

- Date of occurrence.
- Resident's name and contact information.
- Address of the location (with a postcode if possible).
- Description of the symptoms encountered.
- Circumstances e.g. after heavy rain or light rain; during hot, dry weather, etc.

#### **Street lighting**

With the days growing shorter, we all become more aware of the street lighting around the village, especially when it develops a fault or goes out completely. If you spot a problem, you can report it directly to Cheshire East Council using its website www.cheshireeast.gov.uk or over the phone on 0300 123 5020. When you report a problem, you will be asked for the following information:

- Number on the column or the number of the house the light is outside.
- Name of the road.
- Name of the town or village.
- What is wrong with the light.

At the beginning of each meeting, residents have the opportunity to bring matters of particular concern to the attention of the Parish Council. Everyone is welcome to stay and listen for the rest of the meeting.

#### **News from Buerton**

The children's play area on the Buerton playing field has been fully operational over the summer, and has been well used and much appreciated. Disabled access and hard paths are currently being installed and work should be completed by the beginning of November.

The final stage of the work will be to install seating by the play equipment. Funds for this are available so hopefully the playground facility will be completed by the end of the year.

Next year the Parish Council wants to repair and paint the Cheshire railings on the A525 and Windmill Lane. Cheshire East Council, which owns the railings, does not have any budget for this so it is up to locals to find the cash.

# Audlem Public Hall Extension Plans (APHEx)



The Audlem Parish Plans of 2005 and 2010 established the need for better sport and recreational facilities for residents. A committee has been set up, working with the Public Hall Management Committee, to produce detailed plans and then to seek funding. The current plans would provide:

- 1. A venue for the ADCA (Audlem & District Community Action) Tuesday Day Club and other activities for older people following the decision to demolish Thornton House.
- 2. Changing rooms with shower and toilet facilities for Audlem Football Club (and potentially another football club).
- 3. Dedicated room(s) for the village Youth Club which has ceased to function primarily due to lack of premises.
- 4. Better changing rooms and storage facilities for Audlem 5A Drama Group productions.
- 5. Local premises for NHS service providers to offer health and clinical services through Audlem Medical Practice.
- 6. A suitable room for Parish Council monthly meetings.
- 7. Allowance for a room which could be used by a club or organisation running a mini-gym.

8. Suitable rooms for U3A (University of the Third Age) and similar educational meetings.


APHEx is therefore an essential and viable project to cater for the elderly, youth, children, sports, health and education. The costs are estimated to be in region of £500,000 to £600,000.

We have appointed an architect to draw up sketch plans agreed by users, which will will be used for public briefings, feedback and funding applications. We are also in discussion with Cheshire East Council regarding the transfer of a small parcel of unused land at the back of the existing Public Hall.

We have had a preliminary on-site meeting with members of the Cheshire East Planning Department who have indicated general approval of the plans. Audlem Parish Council supports the project and is represented on the APHEx committee by Cllr Dave Siddorns.

We are seeking funding from a wide range of sources including Homes and Community Agency, Right to Build, Lottery, Football Foundation, Youth Funding and Arts Foundations. In addition, the beneficiaries of the improved facilities are expected to contribute significant funding.

Wulvern Housing has installed a ramp at the side entrance to the hall and we hope that Cheshire East's Community Grants Committee will help towards the cost of providing a new shed for storage and an access pathway.

The Friday Coffee Club meets every week at the Lord Combermere between 10am and 12 noon where chat, news updates and speakers provide interest and stimulation. All are welcome.

## Audlem charity shop

Thank you to all our customers, donors and volunteers for helping Audlem Charity Shop achieve another successful year. Saturday afternoon opening, fairs and village events have all contributed to raising money for local charities.

Recycling textiles is a considerable source of income for all charity shops. Nearly every week a charity bag is delivered to houses in the village for you to fill with unwanted items to be collected from your doorstep. The value of textiles has increased dramatically in recent years and the annual global value of second-hand clothes is now more than £620m. Consequently, many charity bags are stolen by organised gangs. Even if they are not stolen, the percentage of your donation reaching the charity of your choice may be as low as five percent as most of the profits go to the commercial companies who make the collections.

To ensure that your donation of goods gives maximum benefit to the organisation that you have chosen, please either take the goods to the charity shop yourself or check on the bag that the collection is by the charity itself and not a third party working on their behalf.
