## **Green Lane Field**

The Parish Council is delighted to confirm that their bid to purchase the field was successful. At the recently held Open Meeting an update on the purchase of, and next steps for, the 11.5 acre field was given.

The clear feedback from residents at the two meetings held in April and the questionnaires submitted was to ensure that the field was not sold to a developer, thereby losing this important green space for ever.



The main points mentioned at the meeting are noted below.

- Before submitting its bid, Councillors had been advised by two professionals that the likely amount to be successful would be considerably above £200,000.
- The successful bid was £227,500, but also having to pay land charges, the vendor's costs and its own minimal legal fees, meant that the total cost was £237,939.32.
- A loan from the Public Works Loan Board of £250,000 over 40 years had been secured at a fixed interest rate of 2.82%, meaning £10,463.66 will be repaid each year.
- The Parish Council's element of Council Tax will increase by approximately 25%. For a Band D property this equates to between £10 and £12 per year, depending on how quickly the new houses currently being built are occupied.
- The Parish Council is not going to rush into doing things with the field.

The plans for the next 12 months are to:

- set up a Working Group of Councillors and volunteers who are Michael Cookson, Steve Elliott, Judy Evans, Neil Goodyear and Ralph Warburton;
- create a temporary access to the field from Shropshire Street.

Unfortunately this will not be wheelchair friendly due to the height of the field above the pavement;

- draw up plans to create a permanent pedestrian access from Shropshire Street and green car park by improving the current access on Green Lane;
- hold another Open Meeting in February next year to report on progress.

## Three Councillors have left

Heather Jones has resigned following her move back to South Wales and is a sad loss. Over the last eight years, the last four of which as Chairman, Heather has worked tirelessly for the village and her experience, dedication and input will be sorely missed. During her Chairmanship, amongst other things, she successfully led the bid for the Green Lane field, the completion of the Neighbourhood Plan and the revision of all the Council's policies.

Due to work commitments both Suzie Warren and Jenny Carlin have also had to resign from the Parish Council. Once again, their input and enthusiasm will be missed.

### **Proposed new housing sites in Audlem**

Cheshire East's Local Plan Part 2 includes proposed development areas in rural areas. There are two sites in Audlem, both on the north side of the village:

- Bird's Nest, the field opposite the Anwyl and McCarthy & Stone sites (20 properties)
- **East View,** the field bordered by the Bird's Nest site, Witton Close and Monks Lane (22 properties).

# Audlem Lass – Eight Successful Seasons

The 8th Season for The Audlem Lass began on a very wet and cold Easter weekend - but things got better, and we have had the most successful season ever. We have carried over 5,400 visitors so far in 2018, not forgetting 450 dogs, with one month still to go. The weather has been in our favour and mid-week charters have been much in demand. Over these eight years The Audlem Lass has carried in excess of 36,000 passengers between Overwater Marina and Audlem. Our team of volunteers has increased to 39 and we continue to encourage new volunteers.

The 'Lass completed its 2018 season at the end of October but it still has one important duty to perform ... bringing Santa along the canal into the village for the Big Switch On. This takes place on 30th November, with Santa and his Helpers arriving at the Wharf, near the Shroppie Fly, at 6pm, with the Audlem Lass bedecked with colourful lights and festive music playing. All of this is preceded by the sale of Floating Wish Candles, raising funds for the RNLI.



## **Audlem Charity Shop Thrives**

Audlem Charity Shop continues to thrive thanks to the generosity of people making donations. Opening times are 10am to 12.30pm Monday to Saturday.

The shop will be open on 30th November for the Big Switch On with a wonderful assortment of Christmas goods, jewellery and new items. Many thanks to all our customers for their support. We donated £28,000 last year to local charities and with your continued donations and shop sales we hope to be able to do the same or more next year.

And finally, just a gentle reminder that we cannot accept large items of furniture (mainly due to the lack of space) or children's pushchairs / prams, medical equipment (zimmer frames, wheelchairs etc) as we cannot verify their safety. Also, we cannot sell electrical items as we cannot PAT test them, however, they can be taken to St Luke's Hospice as part of the monthly collection we have from them.

## **ADAPT highlights**

The Food Group has been very active. The Saturday market stall on the Lord Combermere car park was very popular throughout the growing season. At the Overwater Marina RNLI Festival we demonstrated apple pressing and Chris Lewis gave expert advice on the "Gardeners Question Time" panel. People from all around the area brought apples for pressing at the sessions held in September – the

younger generation were very helpful with this strenuous activity! A social highlight was a canal-side summer party, and the social side continues with the group's monthly meet-ups.

This year the increasing number of members of the Lock 15 Gardeners Group have kept the plots looking cheerful with plenty of flowers and abundant vegetables.

Amply illustrated with fascinating photographs Celia showed us some of the black and white buildings still existing in and around the village including Moss Hall and Highfields and the virtually identical buildings of the Crown Hotel and The Phoenix (latterly the old Co-op) by the local architect William Baker. She told us about our local poorhouse before its closure when the residents were transferred to the Barony in Nantwich and highlighted several events in the village including the visit of the Duke of Wellington. ## The White Lion roars again!

After years of neglect and threat of demolition, The White Lion in Hankelow has been rescued from the brink of extinction.



Investors from Hankelow and its surroundings have succeeded in their efforts to buy their village pub, saving it from demolition. The initial 34 investors who have formed a limited company, The White Lion Community Pub Hankelow Ltd, completed the purchase on 14th September 2018. An agreement has also been reached for part of the site to be developed by a local company, which will be mutually beneficial.

The pub will now undergo extensive refurbishment and investment. It will in time reopen as a Freehouse serving as a community hub. This is a very exciting venture for the community; further investment and support will be needed to make it a success. The next stage is to begin a further phase of fund-raising to meet the costs of repair and restoration. The possibility of obtaining community grants will also be explored.

A reopening timescale cannot yet be set, as this very much depends on the success of fund-raising ventures and the building work to follow. This is fantastic news for our village. The White Lion has been saved and is on the road to recovery!

#### **Audlem Public Hall**

Audlem Public Hall was built in 1904 and in 2017 completed a significant expansion by adding an Annexe. There are now a wide variety of modern amenities available to all local residents. A new Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) has been formed and a small group of trustees tasked with ensuring that the premises meets the needs of the rural community.

The Town Hall has a sprung wooden dance floor, a large stage and seating capacity for up to 200 people. There is a licensed bar and fully equipped kitchen. The hall is regularly used for club meetings and for bingo, badminton, table tennis and bridge. It is home to the 5A's drama group and is used periodically to show the latest film releases. It can be booked privately for business meetings, weddings and celebrations. Zumba and Yoga classes are a regular feature. Also available for hire is a well-maintained snooker room and a small Committee room with kitchen suitable for Board Room type meetings of about 12 people.

The Annexe provides facilities for a senior citizens and carers' club (ADCA), a youth club and changing facilities for the Audlem football teams. There are a number of rooms available for hire including a small hall with kitchen, tables and seating for 40; a treatment room for medical professionals; a Youth Room, ideal for children's parties and the Thornton Lounge more suitable for adult celebrations. In addition there is a fully equipped gym with changing rooms and showers. Gym membership is on a monthly or annual subscription basis; admission by private key fob from 6am to 9pm. # Audlem & District Community Action (ADCA)

An important part of what ADCA does is to support carers by providing regular breaks as well as coffee mornings. We now support over 80 local carers. The good news is that ADCA has been successful in obtaining a Carers' Choice Grant from Cheshire East Council in September 2018. We were successful in obtaining £9,360. Local carers have also benefited this year from a £1,500 grant from Audlem Parish Council which has supported breaks including a canal boat trip and afternoon tea at Combermere Abbey.

We also run the Audlem Carers Support Group, which meets at the Lord Combermere between 9.30am and 11.30am for coffee, chat and information on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month. ADCA is also looking for more volunteers to help run our services assisting people to be socially active and independent and to access health services. We are looking for more volunteer drivers to bring people into our Tuesday Club, to help with running our Medical Transport Service by staffing our office in the Public Hall Annexe on a Monday or Thursday morning or to become a volunteer within our growing befriending service by visiting housebound people.

When you volunteer, the time you give is up to you.ADCA will arrange for the DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) clearance, which all ADCA staff and volunteers have, and appropriate training and support will also be given.
