Good morning, my name is Geoff Seddon and I represent Audlem Parish Council.

This proposed development is unplanned, huge in comparison to the existing village, outside the settlement boundary and on good-quality agricultural land.

The site is in neither the SHLAA nor the developing Local Plan. Audlem hasn't got the infrastructure that it needs to support such a large-scale estate.

- Our sewerage system is already creaking, which leads to problems with blockages and consequent environmental issues.
- As you will hear, our medical practice is full.¹
- Our public transport service is inadequate.
- Our village doesn't have Superfast Broadband and,
- We have a lack of local employment.

The proposed number of properties – up to 120 – is totally out of character with the existing size of Audlem and, as you will hear, contrary to our Village Design Statement.²

Currently there are fewer than 700 properties inside the settlement boundary – a further 120 is a 17% increase. How can this be in keeping with both the character and identity of our village?

The proposed urban-style development is outside the settlement boundary, sited on Grade 2 and 3a agricultural land. It is on high ground at the northern gateway to the village and will be seen from many miles around.

The NPPF of March 2012 states that developments outside the settlement boundary should be located and designed to have access to high-quality public transport facilities.

Audlem has an inadequate level of public transport and therefore doesn't meet this criterion. It is pleasing to note that CEC's Strategic Highways Manager concurs with this view.

Gladman quotes an appeal hearing where a development on the edge of Clitheroe was approved on appeal because of transport links. Is Clitheroe comparable to Audlem? It has a population of over 14,000; a railway station and a bus interchange; large, national shops and considerable employment opportunities.

Where will these new residents work? How will they get there?

The NPPF also states that areas of poorer quality land should be used in preference to that of a higher quality. Again, this criterion isn't met.

Finally, the sustainability of our village doesn't depend on this proposed development going ahead, we already have a thriving selection of shops and small businesses.

In summary, Audlem Parish Council, on behalf of its residents, urges the Committee to refuse this application for a huge, unplanned development which is outside the settlement boundary and is unsustainable and contrary to the provisions of the NPPF.
