CONGRATULATIONS

Warmest congratulations to everyone who helped keep Audlem so clean, attractive and full of flowers over the summer months. Your efforts were rewarded on 28th September when Audlem was named winner in its category of the 50th Cheshire Community Pride Best Kept Village Award.

ALLOTMENTS

A group of about 20 residents is keen to start an allotment scheme in or near the village and the Parish Council is now investigating likely costs etc. If you are able and willing to help by leasing a suitable piece of land – probably around an acre - please contact the Parish Clerk.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

For some time the Parish Council has been pressing the Borough Council for improvements to the toilet block. Although the future of the toilets seemed to be under threat at first, we are now hopeful that the Borough Council will budget for their complete replacement in the next couple of years.

SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTS 2005/06

'THEM WITH TAILS'

'Them with Tails' show was an outstanding success, report T.A.V.A (Touring Arts Visiting Audlem). The event, held at St James' school, was really well attended with over 100 people, some of whom had traveled long distances. The highly talented theatre company succeeded in performing a play which had just as much appeal to the adults in the audience as to the children - some of the audience would say of more appeal to adults! It was a truly family show in every sense of the word.

The drama workshop completely sold out. The children had a ball expressing themselves, and produced a kind of still life show at the end of the workshop. To facilitate a workshop which had such a wide range of ages (3 to10) - and to keep all the children completely engaged showed real skill and talent, and was a joy to watch.

Support for the production was provided by the Cheshire Rural Touring Network, Audlem Parish Council, Crewe and Nantwich Borough Council and the Cheshire County Council. Without their support, the event would not have been possible.

TRYING TO TACKLE THE HGVS THROUGH AUDLEM

Last year's Parish Plan showed that the local residents' major issue was the large number of Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGVs) passing through the village. The Plan proposed, as a first step, trying to de-prime the A525, a view supported by local MP Stephen O'Brien. A detailed letter has been prepared which is to be presented to Government via Stephen O'Brien. It describes how, in Audlem, the A525 is so narrow that two cars have difficulty passing. The Primary Route status, particularly since satellite-navigation became widely used, attracts many hundreds

of long-distance HGVs, regularly blocking the road, posing a massive threat to pedestrians and other road

users, causing accidents, hitting houses and causing damage to historical buildings.

Local residents and Audlem Parish Council have campaigned for over thirty years for the everworsening problem to be tackled effectively. It is recognised there will never be a by-pass and the police oppose weight limits because of a lack of resources to enforce a weight limit.

An experimental signaling system has been tried but sometimes doesn't work for months on end, thus worsening the situation. Unofficially, the authorities say it needs deaths before anything can be done!

After thirty years of successive Governments' failure to act, Audlem Parish Council is now urging the Minister to take action now as the problem is worsening month by month. The planned increase in HGV weight limits will be catastrophic for Audlem on a prime route with narrow, winding roads. De-priming the A525 is the vital first step that will protect Audlem from even worse problems in the future. Article 8 of the European Convention providing for the right to respect for the home has been incorporated into domestic law by the Human Rights Act. De-priming will help ensure residents' rights under that Act are upheld.

A MILKMAN'S LOT

Stuart the Milk has been bringing milk to our doorsteps for the past 45 years during which time he has seen quite a few changes. He believes that a milkman's life is not for everyone - he starts his round at about 12.30a.m and finishes in Audlem around 11.00a.m. His hours of work and his sleep pattern are quite disruptive for his family and social life and Stuart says he has never really got used to his work pattern! As if this wasn't enough Stuart was also a part-time fire-fighter for 35 years!! He tells of one story where, on a very hot summer day he was called to a hedge fire at the home of one of his customers. After dealing with the fire the lady and her husband of the house gave the fire crew of six men a cup of tea. As it was very hot Stuart removed his helmet and tunic at which the lady loudly exclaimed "Oh! It's you Stuart. I didn't recognise you with your clothes on." He says he is still trying to live that one down!

The Milkman's job has been in steady decline since the arrival of supermarkets. When Stuart started his round every house had milk delivered to the doorstep 7 days a week (not all homes had a refrigerator in the early days). We are lucky to still have the services of a milkman in Audlem. In many areas in towns such as Crewe and Nantwich, milk delivered to your doorstep

is not an available option as the rounds are no longer viable.

Like many milkmen, Stuart has been a great help to his customers and others. Besides the usual day to day assistance like changing light bulbs, removing a bat from a bedroom, Stuart also acts as a general neighbourhood watch, alerting people when he hasn't seen someone for a few days and he has reported more than one burglar going about their business in the early hours. He also delivers various information leaflets around the village on a voluntary basis – so all in all "Stuart the Milk" is a very valuable member of our community.
