#### **AUDLEM WINS AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE!**

Richard Furber, Chair of Audlem Parish Council, was delighted to accept a special award at the 2008 Community Pride Competition ceremony held on 25<sup>th</sup> September. Which raises two questions - is there enough space on the wall in The Square to put up our new plaque, and can we do it again next year?

Judges had been so impressed with the efforts of Audlem and 2 other villages (Prestbury & Mottram St Andrew) over the past three years that a special "Excellence" category was introduced to recognise competitors' achievements. Audlem's scores for "Absence of Litter", "Absence of Graffiti", "Absence of Dog Fouling" were the highest attainable. # **Distraction Burglaries**

The problem of distraction burglaries is a perennial one, and whilst I don't wish to frighten people unnecessarily, it is important to remind everyone of the risk, especially to older members of our community

Typically a team of distraction burglars will target the home of an elderly person. One member will call at the front door and engage the occupant in conversation whilst a second member goes around the back and gains entry.

The story given at the front door can vary. Recently in Nantwich the caller at the front door pretended that he was fitting a washing machine next door and he asked the occupant to check the water supply. Whilst she was doing this another man entered the property and searched through the entire house. Others will pose as meter readers or officials from the water or electricity supplier.

If you have an elderly relative then please make them aware, without unduly alarming them, of the additional risk at this time.

Remember to use a door chain and challenge all officials to produce proper identification. If you are still not completely satisfied that the caller is who they say they are then please ask them to call again after having first made an appointment. No genuine caller will object to these safeguards.

Another problem which peaks at this time of year is domestic burglary. As the nights draw in people are arriving home from work long after it has gone dark. If there are no lights on in a house in the late afternoon or early evening then it can be an indication that the occupants are still at work and that the house is empty. It is a very simple matter to fit a timer switch to a lamp, and the switches are inexpensive and widely available. A straightforward measure such as this could easily prevent your home from becoming a target.

# BRITISH WATERWAYS TO GENERATE ELECTRICITY

Regular readers will recall that the Parish Plan's Community Projects team has investigated the potential for a small-scale hydro scheme on the Shropshire Union canal. DerwentHydro, a company that specialises in this field, carried out a feasibility

study that has since been studied in detail by British Waterways (BW).

The prospect of success moved several steps nearer this week. Firstly, a meeting between village representatives and BW was held at which the Waterways explained how they were looking at a range of funding options. The organisation had earlier said they had few if any technical reservations about the scheme using water passing down the locks system in Audlem.

Secondly, both the BBC and the Press Association reported that plans to generate power from wind turbines and hydro schemes alongside canals and rivers across the country have been unveiled. British Waterways has, it was reported, set a target of building 50 wind turbines and an unspecified number of small-scale hydro schemes over the next five years, with the capacity to generate enough electricity to power 45,000 homes.

The public corporation, working with 'Partnerships for Renewables', is now looking at potential sites, believing it could generate over ten times more electricity than it consumes. As the Audlem site was one of the first where a specific hydro proposal has been put forward by a local community, Audlem Parish Plan representatives hope it will be considered very seriously.

BW's Chief Executive Robin Evans said: "This is a real example of a public organisation using its land in innovative ways to generate additional income and work towards a more sustainable future. We look after 2,200 miles of canals and rivers throughout the UK and, whilst always protecting their heritage, are proactively looking at how we can use this resource to make a contribution towards the fight against climate change.

Stephen Ainger, Chief Executive of Partnerships for Renewables, which helps develop renewable energy projects in the public sector, said the announcement marked the beginning of a trend, adding: "It is great to see that British Waterways has demonstrated the vision to become a torch bearer for others to follow."
