A Summary of Parish Council business – October 2009 AUDLEM WINS 2009 COMMUNITY PRIDE AWARD

For the fourth time in a row Audlem has won the Best Kept Village award for parishes with a population of 1,001-2,500. Congratulations to everyone who has worked to keep the village tidy and attractive over the year, especially our lengthsman, Gavin Davies, and members of ADAS for planting and watering the stunning flower displays.

WORK TO START ON IMPROVEMENTS TO CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUND

Work to upgrade the playground is expected to start during November, with completion about 3 weeks later. The old climbing frame will be removed and replaced by modern, more exciting equipment. New safety surfaces will be laid and, at a later stage, Cheshire East Council will lay a path between the car park and playground. The Parish Council is grateful to WREN (Waste Recycling Environmental Limited) for a grant of £11,400, and to the now defunct Crewe & Nantwich Borough Council for a Parish Grant of £17,000. The Parish Council has provided £1,254 match funding as required by WREN. Sincere thanks go to Councillor Peter Morgan who has worked steadily over the past twelve months to acquire funding and see the project through to completion.

SHROPSHIRE UNION CANAL

Parish Councillors have been very concerned at the closure of the canal and the effect this has had on local businesses as well as on the atmosphere of the village. Hopefully repairs will have been completed before the end of October – but it is obvious that Audlem is very dependent upon the canal for much of its trade and vitality. The fear is that the current unwanted tranquillity could become permanent if British Waterways goes ahead with plans to close long term moorings near the village. The Parish Council has already written to British Waterways drawing attention to local concerns. Bill Consterdine and Pam Seddon made representations to British Waterways' at the West Area User Group Meeting on 15th October.

AUDLEM - A LOW CARBON COMMUNITY

On 7th September, the Parish Council voted in favour of participation in the Low Carbon Communities Scheme. This will be a 2 year project, led by the Marches Energy Agency, which is well placed to help Audlem exploit available funding opportunities.

Audlem Bonfire and Fireworks Night

Saturday 7th November 2009

On November 5th 1605, thirteen men planned to blow up the



Houses of Parliament. Among them was Guy Fawkes. The plot was discovered and Guy Fawkes, was caught, tortured and executed. On the very night that the Gunpowder Plot was foiled, November 5th 1605, bonfires were set alight to celebrate

the safety of the King. Since then, November 5th has become known as Bonfire Night. Every year it is commemorated with fireworks and burning effigies of Guy Fawkes on bonfires.

The cost of buying fireworks for "back-garden displays" has increased dramatically over the years. There is no doubt that community displays are the safest and most cost effective way to commemorate Bonfire night – not to mention most

spectacular. For the last 9 years Audlem has hosted a traditional bonfire and fireworks display on the village playing fields. Organised by Audlem Special Events Team (ASET), this high quality event has all the trappings of a traditional Bonfire and Fireworks night and more.

This year's bonfire and fireworks night in Audlem is on Saturday 7th November and will, once again, feature a bonfire – topped off with a Guy made by the local primary school – and fireworks set to music. The bonfire will be lit by the lucky winner of the competition run in conjunction with the school. ASET has increased the budget by over 30% to bring even more value for money of the £3 advanced entry fee (£4 after 31 October).

New to the display this year will be "Gravity Live" a spectacular fire performance including fire eating, breathing, body burning and more. Also, don't miss the giant chocolate fountain with delicious seasonal snacks on sale.

So, remember, remember Saturday 7th November 2009 and join ASET in Audlem for their traditional bonfire and spectacular fireworks display when, once again, the sky will be lit up with an amazing array of colours, accompanied by some great music. Gates open at 4.30pm with fairground rides and stalls. "Gravity Live" start their amazing display at 5.00pm. The bonfire will be lit at 6.30pm with the fireworks display from 7pm (all times are approximate).

CHRISTINGLE SERVICE – 29TH NOVEMBER

The Annual Christingle Service will be held in St James' Church Sunday 29th November at 4pm. This service supports the work of the Children's Society. BRITISH WATERWAYS RESPONSE TO MOORING DEBATE

British Waterways have issued the following statement as a result of the debate on Audlem Online and the petition in local shops currently being signed by many residents. They say:

"Canals are enjoying a renaissance. There are more people using the towpaths and more boats on the water than ever before. This turnaround in fortunes is good news and British Waterways' policy is to further encourage boating.

However long lines of boats moored long term end-to-end along the line of the canal itself are not popular and cause practical difficulties for visiting boats. We therefore encourage investment in offline mooring sites, where a majority of boaters prefer to keep their boat when they're not using them.

Our policy therefore is to reduce (not eliminate entirely) the number of boats moored long term along the waterway. Where a new marina opens, we aim to reduce just one berth on the canal itself for every ten that open. A full copy of the policy is published at www.britishwaterways.co.uk/onlinemooringpol.

As the new Audlem marina begins to fill, new occupants will make regular stops in the village when out cruising or visiting their boats and we expect this to increase rather than diminish business in local shops.

It should be noted that the closure of our long term moorings in Audlem and to the south of the village is currently scheduled to take place on a 'natural wastage' basis — i.e. as and when current occupants of the berths decide to change their long term mooring. Absolutely no one is being forced to leave their existing mooring.

We will shortly publish a national public consultation on our moorings policies. The proposals include working with local communities, boaters, boatyards and other stakeholders to develop mooring strategies which reflect local priorities and which will provide the framework for future moorings decisions."

AUDLEM PRACTICE PARTICIPATION GROUP

The Audlem Practice Participation Group met recently. As well as the patient representatives, Dr Peter Leftwick and Practice Manager Helen Matthews represented the Medical Practice and Brian Bowles also attended to talk about the local hospitals. Brian Bowles, an Audlem resident and Patient Governor of Mid Cheshire Hospitals Foundation Trust, spoke about his role as a Patient Governor. He stressed the close connection between primary and secondary care that the role of Governor is to make sure the Trust do what they say they will do and that they are

responsible to their local population. He was asked about Mid Staffs hospital type issues and how they were monitored at Leighton. Brian confirmed that Governors were involved in key sub committees with Directors and Non Executives, including discussions on clinical governance and audit issues. They also meet patients and monitor standards.

Brian was also asked about 'death rate' data comparisons. This has been followed up since the meeting. It shows the local hospitals have a mortality ratio similar to the national average.

Hospital car parking charges were discussed including the recent increases. Brian confirmed that weekly passes could be purchased for £5 but it was noted that relatives of in-patients didn't necessarily know how long people would be in hospital.

Turning to other issues, an Audlem Patient Participation Group leaflet will be distributed in early November and a link on Audlem Online to include Medical Practice general information is to be prepared.

Dr Peter Leftwick said that the Practice's existing telephone call activity is to be monitored with view to then purchasing a new system in the New Year. The electronic booking in system was working very well in freeing up receptionist time to better deal with phone calls.

It was reported that the Wednesday afternoon surgery opening had gone down very well with patients including for those with chronic conditions. It had also reduced pressure on routine appointments. The question of Saturday opening was raised and it was agreed that extended opening would be kept under review.

A patient complaint about difficulty in obtaining an appointment was discussed. The Practice has also responded directly to the complaint.

The Group was briefed on discussions currently taking place with Cheshire West Primary Care Trust and the Practice's current links with Central & East PCT.

There was a discussion about the Practice's links with Carers. Peter Leftwick plans to attend a local Carers meeting shortly.

FIRST RESPONDERS/AMBULANCE SURVEY

There was an excellent response to the Ambulance survey. Below are details of the survey results which will be taken forward in discussions with the North West Ambulance Service. The figures are the number of actual responses - % have not been used. The Parish Councils would like to thank Margaret Roberts who has analysed the 337 questionnaires in detail.

Many thanks to all those that completed and returned the forms. This will have a strong impact in discussions with NWAS. The next meeting with senior managers and directors of the ambulance service is scheduled for 27th November.

1. Do you support the Parish Councils' campaign to get ambulance response times to 8 minutes or less when attending life threatening calls in rural areas?

Yes 323

No 8 (Don't Know 6)

Comments mainly focused on arguments that rural areas deserve the same level of support as urban areas. A number, however, doubted if that's possible. Others asked about cross-boundary support from Market Drayton.

2. Do you support the campaign to get ambulance response times to 19 minutes or less when attending calls which are serious but not immediately life threatening?

Yes 329

No 4 (Don't know 4)

There was near unanimous support for the 19 minute target being met. The chief executive of NWAS personally promised Audlem representatives a year ago that virtually all emergency calls (Red and Amber) in Audlem would be met in 19 minutes. The current performance, based on NWAS' own figures, is under 40% of ambulances arriving within 19 minutes and just 4% (2 out of 52 calls) of ambulances arriving within 8 minutes

3. Do you think First Responders should attend a wide range of assistance and care until an ambulance arrives?

Yes 326

No 11

The main comment was they must be properly trained.

4. Should First responders be trained to deal with falls? Yes 330

No 7

Again, the main comment was they must be properly trained.

5. Should First responders be trained and allowed to deal with children under 14 years?

Yes 318

No 17 (Don't know 2)

for life threatening emergencies.

The main comments were that children should be treated like anybody else that's ill or injured. Others said that another adult should be present and CRB checks should be standard.

6. Should First Responders be trained and allowed to attend people with diabetes?

Yes 307

No 17 (Don't know 13)

Comments included the need for training and many said that time is of the essence.

7. Should First responders be trained and allowed to administer aspirin (heart cases) and pain killers such as entonox (pain relieving gas)?

Yes 310

No 22 (Don't know 5)

Again, the comments included the need for training and many said that time is of the essence.

8. Do you think Cheshire should have representation on the Board of the North West Ambulance Service?

Yes 333

No 2 (Don't know 2)

Comments were largely amazement that Cheshire was not already represented.
