

CHAIRMAN'S ANNUAL REPORT 2009/2010

Kate Down, Chairman of the Parish Council says:

This is my first Annual report as chairman of Audlem Parish Council. I took over the Chair from Richard Furber in May 2009, and would like to record my thanks to him, other members of the Parish Council, Jean White and John Kemble for their support and advice during my first year in office.

It has been a very busy year for the Parish Council

A new playground facility for 6-12 year olds has been provided with the aid of funding of £17k from the late Crewe and Nantwich Borough Council and £11,400 from WREN. The facility was officially opened by the Mayor of Crewe and Nantwich, Cllr Margaret Simon, on an extremely cold day in January.

With the aid of our LAP Public Transport Committee, the bus service from Audlem to Market Drayton has been reinstated on Wednesdays.

The A525 has now been confirmed as officially deprimed and so Sat Nav updates and new maps will show this. Our next move is to try to get a weight limit put on the road to stop all heavy traffic coming through the village except, of course, for access.

Audlem once again was awarded the Best Kept Village in its category in the Community Pride competition – fourth year in succession!

Our Annual Village Meeting followed the same format as last year, with a very successful cheese and wine evening on March 10th. Displays were set up by several local organisations and there were promotional activities from the local uniformed groups. It also proved a very useful evening for informal discussions with Parish Councillors.

Earlier this month, I attended the 'Cressy Cruise' celebrations held outside the Shroppie Fly to celebrate the centenary of the birth of Tom Rolt, who had visited Audlem on a pre-war canal trip and who wrote a book which inspired the restoration of the navigable canals.

We now have 9 fully trained first responders in the village and NWAS have now provided 4 defibrillators at various locations around Audlem.

The Parish Council has been very active and continues to look for a piece of land suitable for use as allotments. Currently, we do have some plots to consider but no decisions have been made so far.

A new working group has been formed to investigate opportunities for providing a lunch facility at Thornton House. The current Age Concern facility is threatened by closure in the near future, and all concerned are anxious for the service to continue.

Finally, we welcomed David Rowe as a new Parish Councillor in March and we are also pleased to have a new notice board for all to see in the centre of the village.

St JAMES' SCHOOL PATHWAYS

As some of you may be aware the gates surrounding Audlem St James School are now locked during school hours and over the weekend period to ensure the security of the children during school hours, which is paramount, and at weekends to cut down on the vandalism and also dog mess, which is a serious health hazard to the children. Before the decision was made to lock the gates it was confirmed by the Public Rights of Way Officer at Cheshire East and the Parish Council, that these paths are not public footpaths and therefore have no right of way, they are in fact only for direct access to the school.

However, there is one pathway that remains open giving access from Heathfield Road to Emberton Place, which goes past the Audlem Treehouse, and is not locked but is fenced off from the rest of the school.

AUDLEM WILDLIFE & ECOLOGY GROUP

For too long the village has had no focal point for wildlife enthusiasts but we have now formed Audlem Wildlife and Ecology Group. Our second meeting was held in The Lord Combernere on 15 June and the next will take place early in September. Our general approach to our natural environment is holistic, that is it includes the recording and study of everything from the inhabitants of our soil and water to birds and mammals. Records of wildlife in gardens are of interest as well as that in our fields, woods, ponds, and stream and canal corridors. In this way we hope to build up a broad picture of our surroundings and a measure of their biodiversity. Links with Cheshire Wildlife Trust and Nantwich Natural History Society are being developed and local training courses and field events brought to the attention of our members. THORNTON HOUSE -Day Care

Audlem Parish Council and local campaigners have been working to ensure the Tuesday day care facility at Thornton House continues in Audlem after Age Concern end their support. Until a short time ago, Age Concern planned to withdraw from its involvement on 24th August. This has now been put back until the end of March 2011 which will give time for alternative arrangements to be put in place.

An average of fifteen elderly local residents use the Day Care on Tuesdays each week. Campaigners are now asking Cheshire East Social Services to divert money that was paid to Age Concern to the village to help ensure adequate funding is in place.

PODIATRY

Podiatry services in Audlem have been temporarily withdrawn and are under threat of closure. It is likely that, in future, people will have to travel to Nantwich. The Practice, Patient Panel is trying to improve the situation and together with local users and Audlem Online is now battling to ensure this local service is reintroduced.

AUDLEM & DISTRICT BRANCH CONSERVATIVES

The Branch has had a very busy time in the course of the recent General Election and it was appreciated that the successful candidate, Stephen O'Brien, took the time to write personally thanking those who had helped and given support to his campaign.

The Cheshire East Council Elections will be in May 2011 and Audlem Branch is supporting a change in the Ward geographical areas. Currently Audlem is part of the Cholmondeley Ward that also covers Wrenbury, Acton and Bunbury and elects 3 councillors. We want a return to the previous arrangements when Audlem and its adjoining parishes were a separate Ward and could elect its own Councillor to represent them.
