# <u>A Summary of Parish Council business – January 2009</u>

**JANUARY 2009** 

BUDGETS AND PRECEPT FOR 2009/10

In December the Parish Council agreed its budgets for next year and decided against increasing the precept. As a result, we have requested £29,448.25 from the shadow Cheshire East Council. Total annual income from all sources is expected to be in the region of £31,061. Budgets are summarised as follows:

The Parish Council expects a small overspend for 2009/10, which will be met from reserves.

As a result of some nifty work over the Christmas break, bids have been submitted for four schemes: improvements to the children's playground, start up monies for the new allotments association, and improved access arrangements for the Public Hall and the Scout & Guide HQ. PROPOSED MARINA GAINS PLANNING APPROVAL



Plans for a 200-boat marina about a mile north of Audlem on the Shropshire Union canal were approved on 9th January by Crewe & Nantwich Borough councillors. The plans

had been submitted by Richard, Angus and Janet Maughan of Monks Hall Farm, Hankelow but were opposed by many residents in the Coole Lane area, which will be the access route to the new development. Thirty three conditions have, however, been made to the approval and there were fifty objections lodged.

The proposed marina, which will be named after 'Overwater Farm', the original name of Monks Hall Farm until the late Nineteenth Century, attracted support from Audlem Parish Council, British Waterways, the Inland Waterways Association and the Shropshire Union Canal Society. A borough council report for the meeting had said: "With the absence of any marinas between Nantwich and Market Drayton, it is considered that it would provide a suitable base for a new marina." This view was endorsed by councillors at the meeting in Crewe.

Janet Maughan says their family is very pleased approval has been granted. She said: "The project is an exciting venture for the village with the applicants, Richard, Angus and me, hoping to involve local businesses in the development and future business of the marina."

Concern about the state of Coole Lane will clearly be accelerated by the decision and the added pressure on the road and its current condition has been raised at a meeting on 15th January with the county councillor who will be responsible for highways in the incoming Cheshire East authority.

The farm itself will remain an active dairy enterprise, which is also in Natural England's Higher Level environmental stewardship scheme. As part of this, the Maughan's undertake a range of on-farm conservation measures and regularly welcome visitors to look around and learn more about farming and the environment. The Hall, which was formerly a chapel, seats between 80 and 100 people and offers a medium sized venue for a large variety of groups and organisations which cater for all ages within the area. Besides the groups mentioned above, regular users include: the W.I., the History Society, Embroiderer's Guild, Ju Jitsu, Tai Kwon Do, and Yoga. It is also used for a number of ad-hoc private events – children's parties and funeral receptions for example.

During 2006/07 it was extensively refurbished. The final phase of the internal work is to modernise the kitchen. The plans for the kitchen do not include food preparation but for the safe and hygienic storage, heating and serving of food which is brought into the hall. This will give users more choice in the type of events and activities which they hold, offering a real choice to local people to stay in the village for celebrations etc.

#### It's our LINk ! - Join it !Use it !

In 2007, Government legislation abolished Patient & Public Involvement Forums (PPI), which had been the bodies that presented your views to local NHS Trusts.

At the same time, each local Council that has a responsibility for Social Care services was given the duty, and the money, to set up a Local Involvement Network (LINk), bringing together individuals and community groups to work to improve both Health-and Adult Social Care services in the area.

In Cheshire there will be two LINks; one for Cheshire West and Chester, and one for Cheshire East, including Audlem.

The job of the LINk is to help create a local system that will provide each person, from every part of the community, with the opportunity to say what they would like, want or need from their Health- and Adult Social Care services, knowing that the people who plan and run the services will listen, take heed and respond.

I got involved with LINk when I was asked to become a member of the Cheshire LINk Interim Board in May 2008 because I am involved with carers' organisations.

The Interim Board – all volunteers – together with an independent Host organisation (The Carers Federation) has been setting up the formal framework for the two separate LINks, and we are organising Public Meetings at which Members of each LINk will be asked to consider, and, shortly afterwards, to vote on the adoption of a Constitution.

The Interim Board will also be asking for nominations for the Boards of the two LINks, with a postal ballot of Members, timed so that the LINks can be fully established by the deadline of 1<sup>st</sup> April 2009. We have to elect three representatives for the Crewe and Nantwich area on the East Cheshire Board.

It is important that our LINk should have as many members as possible.

Most of the money was raised at a very successful sold-out ceilidh in November and walkers have also been making contributions after each expedition.

ARS has already planned its 2009 programme of walks which have been published on Audlem Online and cover walks of 7 or 8 miles to more strenuous expeditions.
