Parish Council precept 2012-13

The Parish Council's stated policy over the years has been to help and encourage the various organisations and societies within the village by making grants and donations for special events, and to help towards running and capital costs. These have been funded from the precept and, together with the administrative costs, insurance and other expenditure necessary to run the Council, have comprised the bulk of the Council's spending.

Times have now changed. The current government policy of localisation means that services delivered by the Borough Council and County Council that were funded from taxation are now being devolved to be administered and funded locally. Non-statutory services, such as public toilets, will no longer be provided as a matter of course.

As a result, Cheshire East has had its local taxes capped by the government and is devolving services as fast as possible. Informed opinion has it that Parish Council precepts will soon be capped as well.

The main reason for devolvement is that it is supposed to be cheaper to provide services locally and therefore saves the government money. Consequently, only part — or none — of the current costs will follow the service to the new provider. One such example is that of the Audlem public conveniences, which cost Cheshire East £13,000 per year to maintain but have been passed to Audlem without any funding at all. It will now cost Audlem residents some £6,000 a year, which will be funded from the precept.

The Parish Council recognised some time ago that more services would have to be funded locally or they will be cut, cancelled or disappear. To this end, the precept has been raised over the last three years in order to create a working reserve. This year's increase

of five per cent equates to £1.90 per band D household, taking the Parish Council tax to £39.85.

Last year the reserve was required to maintain the cash flow and progress during the refurbishment of the public toilets. It is anticipated that the additional precept levels claimed over this period will continue to be necessary in future in order to maintain these facilities and other essential services that the Parish Council could well be called upon to fund.

This may not be welcome news at a time when household budgets are under pressure, however, the Parish Council has taken these steps to enable public services to be retained, and help maintain the various events and activities within Audlem for the benefit of residents and visitors alike.

Police investigate WC damage

Concern was expressed at the January Audlem Parish Council meeting about damage to our newly refurbished public conveniences. It appears that a small minority of local teenagers have been misusing the facilities as a smoking den — illegal in a public building — and damaged the baby-changing trays and hygiene facilities in the Ladies by standing or sitting on them. The damage has been reported to the police.

Councillors expressed outrage that a small minority could misuse such a hard-fought for village asset and cause mindless damage for which the community has to pay. Suggestions to tackle the problem included sending repair bills to the parents of identified culprits. It was also agreed that there is nothing more sobering for parents than to have a police car at the door.

Audlem's refurbished WCs are protected by a new CCTV camera that records high quality images. Action will be taken against anyone who causes damage.

On a more positive note, the Parish Council hopes to obtain a financial contribution from Cheshire East Council to help with running costs. A letter to this effect has been sent to Ms Erika Wenzel, Chief Executive of Cheshire East Council, with copies to Cllr Rod Menlove, Cllr Mrs Rachel Bailey and Stephen O'Brien MP.

Audlem District Amenities Society (ADAS)

The Britain in Bloom awards given to ADAS in 2010 and 2011 are now recorded in a permanent manner by two new plaques beside the Lord Combermere flowerbed.

We have planted tulips and daffodils in the tubs, troughs and flowerbeds in readiness for spring. The 500 narcissi under the beech tree ('Moseley's tree') in the centre of the village should give us a braver display this year as they are now more established. The 4,000 bluebells planted on the canal banks are spreading fast and will give a beautiful blue haze of blooms.

Sadly, some shrubs did not recover from the extreme cold weather last winter and we have taken action to put this right. New beds are being planned next to the newly refurbished public conveniences, following the acquisition of the small pieces of land by The Parish Council. The Public Hall is to have a new entrance with a potential new bed and we hope to liaise with The Hall Committee about help with planting.

The annual collection through our ADAS envelopes will be underway soon in what we hope will be a welcome, new and more informative manner. We hope that residents will give us the support that is vital if we are to continue to do all that we do for Audlem & District. The loss of our grant of £1,350 from Cheshire East still hurts and we have to run so much faster to do

all we can for the area. Please do remember to leave your ADAS contribution envelopes at Williams Newsagent or the Post Office.

The excellent display of Christmas lights was very well received and we thank everyone for their kind comments. The Big Switch On night is now a permanent fixture in the village calendar and we hope to give it ADAS support again.
