Business summary, July 2014

Help plan the future of Audlem

Following the Public Meeting held on 10 July, the Parish Council voted unanimously at their meeting on 14 July 2014 to create a 'Residents First' Neighbourhood Plan as part of a full Neighbourhood Plan.

Further action has now been taken. At a meeting of the PC Planning Sub-Committee held on 22 July it was agreed to define the Neighbourhood Area as the boundary of Audlem Parish. In addition, a Neighbourhood Planning sub-committee was formed that comprises members of the PC Planning Sub-Committee Working Group plus two other Councillors who volunteered. This new subcommittee will now appoint a Steering Group made up of volunteer residents and Parish Councillors who can oversee the whole process.

Information on how you can help is available on Audlem Online and can be found in paper format in the Post Office, Williams' Newsagents and other venues within the village. These should be completed and posted in the ballot boxes in the Post Office and Williams' Newsagents by 30 August at the latest. Please don't wait until the closing date. The sooner you respond the better!

The returned forms will enable the Neighbourhood Planning Steering Committee to identify issues of importance and to set up working groups as necessary. Initially, the focus will be on Site Allocations, i.e. where residents would like to see development take place in Audlem.

This will all take a lot of time and for it to stand any chance of success in the timescales set by Cheshire East, it will require substantial assistance from as many people as possible. This means not just the Parish Council. Indeed, without a significant input from others outside the Parish Council itself, it will not succeed. Please take this unique opportunity to give input into the future of your village.

A look into the future...

As explained above, Audlem Parish Council is to start working with the community to develop a Neighbourhood Plan. Now the long summer holiday is here, we would like to invite our children and young adults to tell us how they would like Audlem to look five, 10, 15 or 20 years in the future.

Entries can be in art form (painting, drawing or collage) or written in verse or prose (no more than 200 words). There are three age groups (with cut-off date being 31 August 2014): Age 5 and below, Age 6-11 and Age 12-18.

The closing date is 30 September 2014 and entries should be left at Willliams' Newsagents, who have kindly offered to receive them. There will be six prizes - one for art and one for written entries in each age group. So come on, show us what you can do and share your dreams for Audlem yet to come!

Historic highlights

A successful informal evening at the home of David and Elizabeth Huntbach saw people bringing along memorabilia relating to World War 1 to help the History Society in its research.

Amongst them were a Gordon Highlanders' kilt; a cigarette case with a bullet hole through it; service records; a handkerchief; photos; postcards and messages home. These items or photographs of them will be on display at our meeting on 18 September when there will be talks about the experiences of a member's grandfather, and happenings in the village and to village people in WW1. One family has kindly provided a

display produced for a family party which details the experiences in France of one of their ancestors. This will be on show at the meeting.

The Society's outing in June was to the Blackden Trust 'Old Medicine House' near Jodrell Bank, the home of Alan and Grizelda Garner. They moved their house from Wrinehill in 1970 and reconstructed it as an extension to the small, but full of history, Toad Hall or T'owd Hall.

Alan Garner is a renowned author of children's fantasy novels and retellings of traditional British folk tales, whose works are rooted in the landscape, folklore and history

of his native Cheshire. His most famous novel is *The Weirdstone* of *Brisingamen*. There was an opportunity to visit the museum exhibiting finds from the grounds as well as a display of all Alan's novels.
