### Planning Update

**17/0339N** McCarthy & Stone application has gone to Appeal. On 10 January a Section 106 application for funds towards Audlem Medical Practice was approved by the Southern Planning Committee. This will now be sent to the Planning Inspectorate for consideration. McCarthy & Stone have made a new application 17/5776N which has yet to be determined but in the unfortunate event the application is approved then we hope the S106 application will again be put forward.

Details of the number of additional homes Cheshire East Council requires from Audlem are expected in the next month or so. Parish Councillors will then carry out consultation with residents with a view to updating our Neighbourhood Plan.

Parish Council meetings will be held in the Meeting Rooms adjoining Audlem Methodist Church on Mondays, 5th February, 5th March and 9 April 2018. At the beginning of each meeting, residents have the opportunity to bring matters of concern to the attention of the Parish Council. Everyone is welcome to stay and listen for the rest of the meeting.

## Audlem FC

The team was re-formed back in 2012 and we were very lucky in getting sponsorship from both the Lord Combermere and Audlem Dry Cleaners. This enabled us to buy our strip.

Over the years since then, the team has changed in personnel reflecting what occurs in the professional FA leagues; but for us, no fees paid in getting new players.

Today we have a stronger team and, having finished just one from the bottom of the league last season, we are now mid-table and playing with great heart. We have won 6, drawn 1 and lost 7.

This season we did not play any home matches between August and the end of November, in order to allow the playing field to get to its best possible state following the remedial work carried out by Cheshire East last April.



We now begin a series of home games up to the end of March. We play on Sundays at 11am. It would be good to have any villagers there to cheer us as we strive to climb up the league. A big plus is that we are in a semi-final for the FA Vase Competition on the 21st January. In addition we have the new Annexe with the best changing rooms and showers of all the teams in the Crewe Sunday leagues.

## ADAPT Highlights

Having distributed 6,000 copies of the 'ADAPT cycling for all' map in 2017, a grant from the Cheshire East Community Grants Scheme means another 3,000 maps are now available from local establishments, nearest towns and in venues along the routes. The quiet routes are attractive to new or casual cyclists of all ages. Detailed guides to each route are on the Audlem website. Organised rides take place on the second Sunday of each month, leaving the Bridge Inn at 10.30am and stopping for refreshment along the way. Under 18s must be accompanied by an adult. For the winter months we have chosen shorter rides.

Our Food Group meets monthly, sharing knowledge of growing and preparing seasonal food. In winter we plan for the year ahead, get our plots ready, and plant onions, salads, sweet peas and broad beans, some indoors some out. In April, look out for our first Saturday stall of the year, selling mainly seedlings to get Audlem's growers off to a good start.

Similarly there was a record turn-out for the annual carol singing event in the Square accompanied by Crewe Brass.

Many thanks to everyone who contributed to the success of these two events.

In spring ADAS will be working with the Canal and River Trust to refurbish the flower bed that runs alongside the canal from the Mill Shop to the Shroppie Fly. This will be funded by a donation of £1,159 from the Cooperative Community Fund.

## Another Successful Year for the History Society

Our 2017 programme of meetings ended on a fitting note with a talk by our chairperson Celia Bloor - a founder member of the Society.

Celia charted the history of Audlem from its early beginnings when it was first mentioned in the Domesday Book in 1086 to 1655 when the Grammar School was completed.

She explained that Audlem has had various spellings over the years including Aldelyme meaning formerly of the Lyme Wood. Audlem has never had a Lord of the Manor - Moss Hall was often rented out - and this helped to keep the village free. Her extremely interesting and informative talk left the audience keenly awaiting Part 2 and even 3!

2018 promises to be another enjoyable year with a wide range of subjects planned, including trips to Highfields and The Catalyst Science Discovery Centre in Widnes.

## Audlem Methodist Church

Many thanks to all who supported our Christmas Coffee Morning and Charity Fair in December. We are happy to report that £513 was raised, which has been split equally between Macmillan and Church funds. In total we have now donated £1,173 to Macmillan Cancer Care from our varied events over the year.

In November, the year 6 class at our village school were welcomed for a packed morning of drama, film and craft organised by our own Methodist circuit on the theme of remembrance, particularly of the First World War and Christian acts of remembrance. The response of the super children from St James made worthwhile all the preparation needed for this 'premiere'.

Preparations are now in full flow for our annual production. Please note the change of date from February to Wednesday 7th-10th March at 7.30pm. We shall present 'The Vicar Of Dibley' (written by Richard Curtis and Paul Mayhew-Archer with Tiger Aspect Productions). Dibley is a sleepy village populated by parishioners of the maddest variety – sound familiar? Join us to get to know them and their new vicar. ## Canal Art Exhibition

We have now been at Audlem Mill for just over 11 years - though we are currently closed for our normal winter break. Do come in soon after we reopen on 1st March, and you'll see that we have refitted parts of the Mill – it seemed the right time to make some changes.

Our annual Canal Art Exhibition, held in conjunction with the Guild of Waterway Artists, starts from Sunday 18 March to Saturday 14 April. We will have at least 150 paintings, linocuts and photographs from about 20 artists, so do come along and have a look.

## The Annexe

The Annexe was formally opened by the High Sheriff of Cheshire Sarah Callander Beckett. Around 500 residents attended and viewed the facilities. They were also entertained by local musicians including the Duffey Boys with their special song describing the Annexe as a 'bit on the side' and the whole afternoon was available on YouTube. Since the launch the small team of volunteers have been working hard organising how the Annexe will operate.



The Audlem and District Community Action hold their regular Luncheon Club and activities in the Thornton Room, the Youth Club meet in their own room furnished and decorated to their choice and Audlem Football Club now has the best facilities in the league and the results on the pitch have been much improved. Our community not-for-profit gym, which is now open 15 hours a day, 7 days a week, has proved hugely popular with over 160 members. 5A's Drama Group will be using the Annexe as their 'back stage' for the pantomime productions and we are trying to improve the storage available. The Annexe has hosted a meeting of the Cheshire East Council Cabinet, Audlem Parish Council held its Finance Committee there and both the Thornton Room and the Youth Club have been hired by villagers for private functions with more in the pipeline.

A lot of interest has been shown by health professionals in the Treatment Room. We now have a local physiotherapist providing services by appointment in the Annexe and are expecting other services to be available, all of which will save travel to Crewe or Nantwich. We now have over 250 people using the Annexe with over 25 volunteers. It is early days but the signs are Audlem people are making good use of the new facilities.

## St James' Church: A Fragile Building

The picture of St James' Church is often used as a symbol of Audlem. It is a place of worship, week by week, for people of all ages, for the happy occasions as well as the sad. It is open every day for visitors, either to explore its history or to be quiet and pray. It is at the heart of the village in every sense and is a tourist attraction. Today it is in a rather fragile condition.

Every 5 years the building is inspected, and the last 2 inspections have highlighted several areas in need of attention. We have already carried out expensive internal repairs to stabilise cracks and the column supports. Our church finances are entirely dependent on the generosity of our group of regular worshippers, but the building is also used by the wider community. We have managed to cover our running costs and repairs over the past few years but this is not easy.

The work that needs doing is not glamorous but essential. We need to do the work before it becomes a 'health and safety' issue. The work is to the tower roof, the tower masonry and the wall above the west door. We cannot be certain how much this work will cost, but we expect in the region of £75,000. Once we have raised a certain amount of money then we can apply for 'match funding' grants – so first we need to do what we can by fund-raising here in our community.
